

HOOSIER NATIONAL FOREST'S MOU ADDS 28 MILES TO INDIANA'S LANDMARK LONG DISTANCE TRAIL [SEE MAP]. A team led by KHTA president Charles Andrew has been working with HNF staff for several years to identify an acceptable route. The route uses a mixture of existing trails Brown County Horse Trail D, and HNF Multiple Use Nebo and Hickory Ridge Trails, with road walk connections between them. **The complex reaches nearly to the 3 miles of KHT Pioneer barn easement trails at the south end near SR 58, and to the 42-mile Tecumseh to the north, for a total string of 74 miles.** Work is ongoing to make arrangements for KHTA members to adopt sections to monitor the trail and help make trail improvements. Travel warning: a few of the numbered trail connections in the Hickory Ridge Trail complex can be confusing, and some need trail surface upgrades. A KHTA crew will be improving the signage a.s.a.p. If you wish to check out the trail right away, just be careful when transitioning.

DNR APPROVES EXTENDING THE TECUMSEH AT THE TT—HNF GAP AT PANTHER BRANCH: the old track/logging road across the creek up to HNF property on the ridge should be improved & signed this year.

I worked with experts at Indiana University (Bloomington) to produce high-resolution Lidar topographical maps covering Maumee Scout Reservation (MSR), parts of the Hoosier National Forest adjacent to MSR, the Deam Wilderness, and Ransburg Scout Res-



ervation. These maps are presently used by Scouts at the MSR. Prior to moving to Indiana I lived and worked in several eastern states, and enjoyed hiking in each, including trails in White Mountains National Forest in New Hampshire. **Ron Conrad** (far left), is an IT specialist, and **Ryan Franklin**, [left] is taking on the thankless task of Board Secretary from Nina Andrew.

THE KHTA'S FIRST GATEWAY 5K-FUN RUN in Martinsville's Jimmy Nash Park went off without a hitch on March 3, 2018 as advertised. Proceeds more than paid the bills, but if stolen would probably only afford one night at a posh hotel in downtown Indianapolis. The runners came as far away as from Orleans and Henryville. All 25 of them had a lot of fun and admired the surprisingly interesting, hilly trail.

The race route was substituted for a proposed Marathon at this date in the statewide trail running calendar, beginning at the Jones Parking Lot and the proposed eventual northern trailhead for the Tecumseh/160 Mile Knobstone Hiking Trail. It's useful to get the race into the calendar while the date was still available. Something to look forward to when permission for the official DNR trail route is

granted to extend the Tecumseh to the edge of Martinsville at Burton Lane. Because of I69 construction and new exit limitations, access to Morgan-Monroe State Forest and its trails is getting difficult. A trailhead here may prove valuable in future.
